T-Flag Display OK'd For TITAN Bases

Operational bases for the TITAN intercontinental ballistic missile have been given the goahead to fly the Treasury's Minuteman T-Flags after achieving 90 per cent or more employe participation in the U.S. Savings Bond program for a period of 60 days.


Authority to display the T-Flag at such missile sites was recently cleared through the Treasury Department in Washington, according to N. A. Johnson, area manager in Denver, Colo., for the Savings Bond Division.

Reports from TITAN bases so far show that T-3. Mountain Home, Idaho, and T-5, Marysville, California, have both achieved 100 per cent Martin employe participation and are eligible to fly the T-Flag.

T-2, at Ellsworth AFB, South Dakota, is also eligible to fly the T-Flag with 99.6 per cent participation. This report was made last week by E. P. Mussett, manager of T-2 operations.

Time Saving Teleticketing Service Now in Operation

Travel service activities took on a new look at the Denver Division during the week of November 14 with the beginning of a new airline ticketing process. Now in operation

is a "Teleticketing machine" that provides flight tickets within 15 minutes after reservations are re-

"This new device has eliminated the heretofore time consuming process of Travel personnel having to write up each ticket,' George Theobald, Travel Service supervisor, said. "Better and faster service can now be provided at several points to Martin perand within minutes the requested information is sent over the wires to Martin in the form of a ticket.
